

NIH Reports Hearing Loss Prevalence in US Adults Is Declining

New research findings announced by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) reveal that hearing loss among US adults aged 20 to 69 has declined over the last decade, even as the population of older Americans continues to grow. These findings, published online December 15, 2016 in JAMA Otolaryngology—Head & Neck Surgery, also confirm that hearing loss is strongly associated with age and other demographic factors such as sex, race/ethnicity, and education.

Checks for membership dues MUST be made out to HLAA. \$35 Individual & \$45 Family According to the research, noise exposure, which is potentially preventable, was also significant but less strongly associated after adjustment for other factors. The research was supported by the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders (NIDCD), part of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), and the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), part of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Researchers found that age was the strongest predictor of hearing loss, with the greatest likelihood of hearing loss in the oldest age group surveyed (aged 60 to 69). Across all ages, men were about twice as likely as women to have hearing loss. In addition, lower education level and heavy use of firearms were associated with hearing loss. Non-Hispanic white adults were more likely to have hearing loss than adults in other ethnic groups, with non-Hispanic black adults having the lowest risk.

NIH says the researchers do not know the reasons for the decline in hearing loss prevalence, but they speculate that possible factors could include fewer manufacturing jobs, increased use of hearing protectors, less smoking, and advances in healthcare, including better medical care to manage risk factors associated with hearing loss.
